#### 18. Course Description:

This course gives analytical examination of Arab politics with emphasis on legitimacy crises of Arab regimes. The course analyses structures and political processes of Arab political systems and their impact on human rights in the Arab world. It focuses on the social and cultural context of the political process and power relationship between the three branches of governments and the impact of that on human rights in the Arab world. It also focuses on the causes behind the emergence and development of constitutional rights, concepts, and practices. Emphases are on the analysis of civil, economic, and political rights. Through some case studies (Jordan and Egypt), the course analyses the status quo of human rights and its relation to the political systems.

#### 19. Course aims and outcomes:

#### A- Aims:

The objectives of this course are:

- 1. To understand structures and political processes of Arab political systems and their impact on human rights in the Arab world
- 2. To understand legitimacy crises facing Arab regimes.
- 3. To understand the social and cultural context of the political process and power relationship between the three branches of governments and the impact of that on human rights in the Arab world.
- 4. To understand the causes behind the emergence and development of constitutional rights, concepts, and practices in the Arab world.
- 5. To understand the dynamic relationship between politics, human rights, and legitimacy crises.
- 6. To develop an understanding of human rights issues in the Arab world, particularly in Jordan as representing the monarchical systems and Egypt as representing the republic systems.
- 7. To help develop skills in writing term papers.
- 8. To provide practice in oral presentations, and to sharpen the analysis of current events.

- 1. Analyses, assesses and contributes to the issues of human rights development and humanitarian development in the institutions of the international and local community, United Nations organizations and non-governmental organizations.

- 3. Analyses and assesses qualitative sources of information in the area of human rights and humanitarian development.
