19. Course Description:

This course addresses the relationship between social work and human rights, focusing on the role of social workers in promoting human rights among their beneficiaries, whether individuals, families, institutions, or communities. Students will recognize how social work skills and tools connect to human rights. The course emphasizes practical aspects, particularly concerning marginalized and disadvantaged social groups, training students to advocate for these groups' rights, educate them about their rights, and empower them to pursue their rights and seek justice. Various related social issues will be discussed, such as child labor and trafficking, the exploitation and abuse of women, female infanticide, gender selection, slavery, and similar issues. Students will also be introduced to relevant local legislation and the official and civil institutions operating in this field.

20. Program Intended Learning Outcomes:

1. **Comprehensive Understanding of Human Rights Concepts:** Analyze and understand fundamental concepts and international treaties related to human rights, including the right to development, minority rights, women's rights, and children's rights.

3. **Policy Analysis:** Skills to analyze and evaluate public policies at local and international levels, focusing on how these policies impact human rights and sustainable development.

5. **Communication and Advocacy:** Develop effective communication and advocacy skills to promote human rights, including report writing, presentation skills, and participation in public campaigns.
