19. Course Description:

The course aims to firstly introduce students to major conventions establishing human rights norms relating to health. It addresses governments' obligations to ensuring human rights to health. Secondly, the course highlights the importance of ensuring environmental development and sustainability. With the help of some case studies, the impact of nuclear weapons on human rights to health and human rights to unpolluted environment will be addressed.
