19. Course Description:

This course addresses the historical development of children's rights, as well as the international and regional treaties that enshrine these rights and establish mechanisms for their implementation. The course also discusses practical issues that illustrate the role of governments, especially in the developing world, in shaping policies aimed at protecting children and training them to participate in decision-making within their local communities. Additionally, the course covers national legislation regulating children's rights and introduces the international and national official and civil organizations working in the field of children's rights, presenting national plans and strategies concerning childhood.

- 5. Advocacy and Communication:** Cultivate effective communication and advocacy skills to promote children's rights, including the ability to engage with stakeholders, formulate policy recommendations, and raise awareness about children's rights issues.
