19. Course Description:

This class will combine theory and practice to introduce the students to creative and innovative ideas to establish peace around the world where crisis have led to conflict and violence. This course gives graduate students an opportunity to delve into complex issues that are responsible for war and violence in the Middle East region and globally. We will examine crisis in the middle east region including the Trump-Peace-Initiative, conflict in Syria and Lebanon, the occupation of Iraq, and sectarian violence fueled by regional actors and outside powers.

3. **Evaluate Peace Initiatives and Diplomatic Efforts:** Students will assess the effectiveness of peace initiatives, such as the Trump Peace Initiative, and critically examine the role of diplomacy and peace-building efforts in conflict resolution.
4. **Develop Research and Critical Analysis Skills:** Students will enhance their research and writing abilities, producing a comprehensive, well-argued 25-page paper on a topic related to peace and conflict.
5. **Propose Innovative Solutions to Conflict:** Students will design creative, evidence-based approaches to peace-building, taking into account the unique socio-political factors of specific conflicts.
6. **Reflect on the Social and Human Impact of Conflict:** Students will gain awareness of the humanitarian consequences of conflict and develop a global perspective on the importance of sustainable peace efforts.

Case three :

The crisis in the Persian Gulf area and the Trump administration cancellation of the nuclear agreement with Iran by the 5 +1, new sanctions against Iran, the struggle for regional power and influence between Iran and Saudi Arabia, will all be examined and explained how this is affecting stability in the region. The American administration and the feud between regional powers, affect Iraq, and fuels sectarian violence.

Students are expected to find a formula to ease tensions in the region and propose a working paper to address the key issues that are outstanding and possibly could be the reason for a war in the region.
